The Cowichan Valley Capitals requested permission to expand and enhance their dressing room, with construction to be completed at no cost to the Island Savings Centre. The improvements could enhance the facility and return a sixth dressing room back to the Centre.

The Capitals requested:

- 1. A lease on the expanded space for a 5 year period at a cost of \$1;
- 2. That the front office space currently occupied rent free (in return for bearing construction cost) be leased to the Capitals at no cost for a further 5 year period.

It was suggested that the space in the arena corridor currently used as the Capitals office and storage space be returned to the Centre for their use.

Concern over soundproofing of the requested dressing room space has been expressed to the Capitals management, as shared space includes the floor of the Theatre House, walls of the Rehearsal Hall and hallways used by performers, and noise spillage would be inevitable. It was determined that approval for the renovation would be contingent upon the proviso of a sound proofed dressing room with zero sound transference.

2013-46

It was moved and seconded to accept the recommendation:

- That the CV Capitals be granted permission to expand and enhance their dressing room with a lease on the expanded space for a 5 year period at a cost of \$1 with a proviso of zero sound transference to all bordering Theatre spaces;
- That the front office space currently occupied by the CV Capitals be leased to them at no cost for a further 5 year period;
- 3. That the hallway office space used by the Capitals be transferred back to the Island Savings Centre.

A Staff Report of July 8, 2013 reviewed amendments to the Island Savings Centre expenditure plan. It was suggested that capital items be reprioritized to address the increased costs in property insurance, the decrease in revenue from School District rentals, and the cost to initiate a security safety program including cameras and hiring of personnel to address ongoing security concerns.

The increased expenses to the budget could be offset by deferring some approved capital expenditure items.

A Staff Report of June 9, 2013 was submitted.

Due to a delay in obtaining grant approval from BC Hydro, not enough of the off-ice season remains to complete the approved arena refrigeration compressor project as planned. It was recommended that the compressor replacement project be deferred to the 2014 budget; that the CVRD Chair be authorized to sign the BC Hydro agreement in order to obtain the grant; and the expense included in the 2014 budget.

It was moved and seconded to recommend that the CVRD Board approve:

- 1. The deferral of the arena refrigeration compressor replacement project from summer 2013 to summer 2014;
- 2. The CVRD authorize the CVRD Chair and Corporate Secretary to sign the BC Hydro Powersmart Incentive Fund Agreement #BHC-00686 prior to September 4, 2013 for a BC Hydro Incentive Grant of a maximum \$28,233 towards the Island Savings Centre Arena Compressor replacement project that will take place in 2014:
- 3. The total expenditure of the arena compressor replacement project of approximately \$82,000 less the BC Hydro incentive grant, and reinstate the required funds in the 2014 budget.

SUBJECT: Alcohol, Tobacco, and Drug Discipline Policy

Recommendation/Action:

That the Island Savings Centre Commission approve the following amendments to the Centre's Alcohol, Tobacco, and Drug Discipline Policy:

Discipline Policy Steps

1. Step 1: First Offence:

Written warning to the user group indicating that a subsequent infraction will result in the cancellation of a booking, with the user group still responsible for that booking's rental fee.

2. Step 2: Second Offence:

Cancellation of a booking, with the user group still responsible for that booking's rental fee.

Exception: Cowichan Theatre

One-night rentals of the Cowichan Theatre are typical rather than use by on-going user groups, therefore the handling of alcohol in unlicensed areas must be different from the Island Savings Centre. The Cowichan Theatre has added a clause as an addendum to all rental contracts stating that any alcohol consumed outside of designated licensed areas is subject to a \$7500 fine payable by the licensee.

Having reduced warnings for unlicensed alcohol potentially lessens the chance that unlicensed alcohol consumption will cause the facility to be fined a minimum of \$7,500 by the Liquor Control and Licensing Branch.

The facility should not suffer a loss of revenue due to unlicensed alcohol infractions, so the user group would still be responsible for the rental fee.

Background:

A copy of the Centre's current Alcohol, Tobacco, and Drug Policy, and Alcohol, Tobacco, and Drug Discipline Policy, are provided for background.

There has been increased enforcement by the Liquor Control and Licensing Branch on the issue of unlicensed alcohol in dressing rooms.

Staff representing Cowichan Lake Recreation, South Cowichan Recreation, North Cowichan Parks and Recreation, the Cowichan Sportsplex, CVRD Parks, and the Island Savings Centre have met to review existing unlicensed alcohol policies. Staff continue to recommend consistent policies across the region. Moving from three steps of enforcement to two is recommended by the staff from all these areas, and a similar staff report is anticipated for their commissions and committees.

As well as the recommended reduction in the policy of three steps of enforcement to two, staff have recognized that even one empty can be deemed an offence, and that a warning can carry over to the following season.

It should be noted that in the case of the Island Savings Centre this season, there is a further reason for teams not to bring unlicensed alcohol, as dressing rooms are licensed, and beverages will be supplied at a reasonable price.

Definition:

The following document is in regards to alcohol, tobacco, and drug (ATD) consumption by user groups in unlicensed areas within the Cowichan Centre (CC) facility.

Policy

The use or consumption of Alcohol, Tobacco, or Drugs (ATD) is prohibited in all Cowichan Centre facilities, unless specified with a posted valid B.C.L.C.B permit in accordance with the BC Liquor Control and Licensing Act.

Those who do not abide will be subject to disciplinary action by CC management and or legal action.

Duties and Responsibilities

- The Cowichan Centre Alcohol, Tobacco, and Drug Consumption Policy and the Alcohol, Tobacco, and Drug Consumption Disciplinary Policy to be included in all Cowichan Arena / Theatre / MPH user group contracts, to be signed off by all user group representatives.
- User group contracts to specify that groups must clear facility dressing rooms within 45 minutes after completion of their rental agreement,
- Signage posted in the Arena Lobby, Heritage Hall, Multipurpose Hall, Arena, Multi-purpose Hall Dressing Rooms, and Theatre citing the following:

"The use or consumption of Alcohol, Tobacco, or Drugs is prohibited in all unlicensed Cowichan Centre facilities. Those who do not abide will be subject to disciplinary action by the Cowichan Centre Management and/or legal action."

"Dressing Rooms are to be cleared within 45 minutes upon completion of your event"

Definition:

The purpose of the Alcohol, Tobacco, & Drug Discipline Policy is to provide direction in regards to discipline in the event that the Alcohol, Tobacco, & Drug Policy is breached.

Discipline Policy Steps

1. Step 1: First Offence:

Verbal warning/discussion with the Licensee to be followed up with a letter of warning indicating that a subsequent infraction will result in the Licensee being placed on probation.

2. Step 2: Second Offence:

The Licensee is formally advised and placed on probation, which will result in cancellation of bookings if there are any further infractions. Being placed on probation could also affect their future bookings.

3. Step 3: Third Offence:

The Licensee's booking is cancelled for a minimum of up to 5 sessions and the cancellation would double with subsequent offences. With the third cancellation the Licensee would automatically be suspended for one calendar year. The Licensee would be advised and would have the right to appeal cancellations or suspensions to Cowichan Centre Management.

SUBJECT: Harassment in the Workplace Policy Review

Further to the June 13, 2013 motion from the Island Savings Centre Commission, I have reviewed the CVRD's existing Harassment in the Workplace policy. I have also reviewed the e-mails that led to the request for the policy review, as well as the CVRD's policies on Standards of Conduct and E-mail, Internet and Computer Use. Finally, Harassment policies from a number of other local governments were reviewed and compared to the CVRD's policy.

The CVRD's Harassment in the Workplace policy was updated in 2011 as part of an extensive policy and procedure review, and formally approved on March 1, 2012. Subsequent to that adoption, the Human Resources Division undertook to provide a series of two-hour policy and procedure training session for our regular staff. This was to ensure that staff were aware of the policies that govern aspects of their employment, including those related to expectations of their workplace conduct.

The Harassment In the Workplace policy is very broad in scope, and adequately protects against discrimination based on any of the "prohibited grounds" identified under the Human Rights Code - age, sex, marital status, family status, etc. It also addresses behaviours that might not fall under one of these protected grounds, such as those that might be construed as personal harassment or workplace bullying.

The range of possible consequences for a breach of the policy is identified, but specific consequences for any particular breach are not. This is because the details of each complaint and the findings of the investigation of the complaint are so fact-specific, and subject to a degree of interpretation on the part of the person investigating the complaint. Therefore, the specific consequence to be faced is best determined after a thorough review of the facts, taking all mitigating and aggravating factors into account.

The CVRD's Harassment in the Workplace policy was intended to be, and is generally interpreted as, a document geared towards staff, not elected officials. Most of the policies and procedures, particularly those that fall under the CAO's purview, apply to staff only. If a Director were to engage in inappropriate behaviour towards an employee, the CAO would have limited ability to sanction the Director for the behaviour. That said, the CAO would work with the Board Chair to try to resolve the issue, thereby avoiding the potential for the employee to seek recourse through other means, such as the Human Rights Tribunal or WorkSafe BC.

The Human Rights Tribunal has the ability to sanction the Director personally. In all likelihood, the Tribunal would also sanction the CVRD as a corporate entity for not maintaining a harassment- and discrimination-free working environment. Behaviour on the part of a Director that did *not* fall under the *Human Rights Code*, but instead constituted workplace bullying, would be treated as a claim under WorkSafe BC Regulations. However, such a claim would punish the CVRD as a corporate entity (through increased premiums and potential penalties), and likely not the Director responsible for the behaviour.

A number of local governments specifically identify that elected officials are covered under their Harassment policies. However, they provide no information as to the range of potential consequences to elected officials who contravene the policy. They also do not address how they overcome what I see as two main pitfalls of including elected officials under the policy:

- 1. The highest-ranking staff member who could apply sanctions under the policy is the CAO, who is the Board's employee. This puts the CAO in the untenable position of potentially jeopardizing his or her own employment to apply a policy which, at its heart, requires some degree of interpretation and discretionary decision-making. Invariably, faced with a "he said/she said" situation, the CAO would have to decide whose account of the incident giving rise to the complaint is the more accurate version. If this is not the Director's version, then the CAO is saying not only that the Director has engaged in improper behaviour, but also that the Director is not being entirely truthful.
- 2. The range of practical options for sanctions under the policy would be much more limited for elected officials than for employees, resulting in a behaviour-governing policy that may treat different classes of individual differently for the exact same offense. While termination is a possible result for staff, the same cannot be said for elected officials. The Local Government Act and Community Charter regulate if and how an elected official might be removed from office. A violation of a workplace policy itself would not result in any apparent sanction of an elected official.

In summary, I do not recommend any modifications to the current Harassment In the Workplace policy at this time. Changing behaviour-governing policies such as this or the Standards of Conduct policy to cover elected officials will likely not achieve any practical outcome. Should the Directors feel that something more formal is needed to govern behaviour, it is open to them to develop and agree to abide by a "Code of Conduct", similar to those in place for patrons at our various recreation facilities. Again, though, the range of consequences for a breach of this Code may be limited. The pressure to be true to your word in signing a Code of Conduct may be more effective at maintaining appropriate behaviour than the threat of sanctions under this Code.

Background:

North Cowichan Parks and Recreation recently adopted this code of conduct. Management of both the Island Savings Centre and Cowichan Aquatic Centre are striving toward consistency in a facility code of conduct.

The code of conduct is instrumental in assisting staff with dealing with a variety of situations in terms of being a tool for them to refer to, back-up for their actions, and simple recognition for everyone's role in the facility. The posting of a Facility Code of Conduct is a key instrument to enable staff and public alike in recognizing what is and what is not acceptable behaviour in our facilities.

Recommended wording, based on what is now used at the Cowichan Aquatic Centre is as follows:

Island Savings Centre Code of Conduct for All Persons

- 1. I am responsible for and will control my actions at all times or I will leave the facility.
- 2. I will treat all others and this facility with respect.
- 3. I will interact in this facility in a safe and courteous manner.

Failure to comply with this code of conduct may result in your immediate expulsion from this facility and/or limitations on your ability to enjoy its use.

Background:

In 2008, with the opening of the Cowichan Aquatic Centre, approximately 4,000 sq. ft of space in the Aquannis Centre's lobby, offices, and change rooms remains unused.

In September, 2012, the Cowichan Valley Division of Family Practice presented a potential use of that space to the Island Savings Centre Commission, proposing a primary care facility.

A recent August 22nd, 2013 meeting with representatives from the Vancouver Island Health Authority outlined that there remains potential with this proposal. VIHA staff will be developing a business case over the next three months to determine viability.

As outlined in the second report, the Island Savings Centre Commission may consider promotion of the World's Largest Hockey Stick, solely as a unique tourism icon. This initiative could have expenses that would not be expected to be the responsibility of another organization.

The other aspect is the purchase / creation of marketing materials to sell for both promotion and revenue generation. It is anticipated that revenue would exceed expenditure over the long term, and it would be the intention to keep a limited amount of inventory. Labour to sell these items is not considered an additional expense, as the sales would occur from the Cowichan Ticket Centre using existing staff.

Background:

In July 2013, the Commission received a request from the West Coast Men's Support Society, proposing their marketing of the World's Largest Hockey Stick and Puck as an organization fundraiser. The discussion was tabled so that staff could review potential marketing for this asset. Alana Plunet has been taking the lead on reviewing potential marketing, which will form the basis of a second staff report on this topic.

Staff feel concern that there should be appropriate control over marketing this asset. If an outside organization assumes control of marketing, it has the potential of reflecting badly on the CVRD. For example, in 2009 when planning for the expenditure of refinishing the Stick, a local entrepreneur desired to sell T-shirts with the slogan "Fix the Puck n Stick", with part of the proceeds going to the refinishing. Management determined that slogan to have potential negative impact, and chose not to participate in that opportunity.

Once the Commission determines the extent of marketing the Stick, staff can enter into formal agreements for the production or sales of items. CVRD staff would use discretion on appropriateness, as well as following CVRD policy. The primary goal would be appropriate marketing for a community asset, not fundraising for another organization.

As per today's telephone conversation, please find below a proposal regarding the utilization of the WLHS as a front end social enterprise for our organization.

Background

As per our website, the mission of the West Coast Men's Support Society (WCMSS) is to help men, families & community to create fuller healthier lives. We achieve this by offering men the tools & strategies by which to live their lives with integrity, trust, responsibility and accountability. The WCMSS inspires men to live their richest, most meaningful and healthy lives with their families and community! We have been delivering supportive programs for men in the region for four years and are now expanding across the province. It is our hope that this project will support our expansion.

Social Enterprise Proposal

Introduction:

Utilizing the WLHS as the backdrop, it is the hope and vision of the WCMSS to raise funds for our organization by developing a sales, marketing & PR engine that combines the development of goods and services relating to the WLHS along with the employment of marginalized/unemployed/senior men in our community.

Types of goods and services:

- Replica hockey sticks with the WLHS branding these sticks can be produced locally using donated pine beetle and/or scrap wood a shop can be set-up (hopefully donated) that would include the necessary cutting, sanding, and labeling equipment (hopefully donated) to produce the sticks. Men would be trained to operate the equipment
- Various promotional items including: t-shirts, sweats, hoodies, key fobs, caps, pucks, etc.
- One idea would be to invite famous hockey players (in the area) to come and have their picture taken with the stick behind them then have them autograph 8 x 10 pictures that could be sold and/or auctioned off on our website
- We would have a website to allow for online promotion & purchasing of the items this would be tied to both the CVRD and WCMSS websites

- we would have a "Stick Shack" that would be situated by the stick that would then sell all of the above items – the shack could be made of environmentally friendly materials so that it could serve more than one purpose in the region. It could be solar powered too.

Audience:

Our target audience would include any of the following: locals, tourists, and hockey fans worldwide.

Considering that there is a replica of the stick at the Hockey Hall of Fame in Toronto, we could take advantage of the large audience that it attracts to promote more items.

Initial Financing:

It would be ideal to secure seed funds from local government, along with other local fund sources such as Rotary and Lions. We would certainly be seeking input and direction around best sources and utilization.

Next Steps (need to work out timeline):

- 1. Feasibility study can we make this concept viable?
- 2. Confirm funding once step 1 is complete.
- 3. Research space for hockey stick production
- 4. Locate machinery for step 3
- 5. Connect with natural builders, i.e., Ecosip, OUR, etc. re: Stick Shack
- 6. Locate promotional goods supplier
- 7. Recruit staff
- 8. Soft launch
- 9. Media blitz
- 10. Full launch once production and retail space are in place

Regular Reporting to Funders

Provide funders with quarterly progress reports.

Note: we will need an advisory team (Quality Control, Accounting, Marketing/PR) to ensure that we are on track.

Recommendation/Action(s):

- 1. That the Island Savings Centre Commission allocate up to \$4,500 in the 2014 budget for increased promotion and display of the World's Largest Hockey Stick and Puck.
- 2. That the Island Savings Centre Commission allocate up to \$4,500 in the 2014 budget for promotional items, for the purposes of re-sale through the Cowichan Ticket Centre.

Relation to the Corporate Strategic Plan:

Expand the promotion of Cowichan Region products.
Financial Impact: (Reviewed by Finance Division:)
Recommendation that one-time expenses of \$4,500 be incurred for promotion.
Recommendation for the purchase of up to \$4,500 of re-sale items, for both revenue generation and promotion.

Background:

In July 2013, staff discussed with the Island Savings Centre Commission that at the September Commission meeting, staff would present ideas on World's Largest Hockey Stick and Puck marketing.

It has become apparent that there are needs in two separate areas - expenses related to promotion or increased display of the icon, as well as expenses for the purchase of promotional re-sale items.

1 Identified Promotion Needs

a. Protect the name World's Largest Hockey Stick

There have been other icons, who have claimed to be the world's largest hockey stick, which is not the case. We are able to file on-line for a Trademark with a legal definition of "World's Largest Hockey Stick". A trademark provides proof of ownership, and allows us to flag an infringement under the Trade-marks Act. Approximate cost is \$300.

b. Web Address

We should protect a web address that is purchased / renewed every five years, capturing both .ca and .com addresses. Approximate cost is \$65 for www.worldslargesthockeystick.ca, and \$75 for www.worldslargesthockeystick.com. We can identify content at a later date.

c. Facebook page

Economic development has offered to help brand the World's Largest Hockey Stick by promoting an online presence through the Cowichan Tourism page. Facts, historical background, etc. could be presented. Tourism staff would maintain the page, while Island Savings Centre staff could respond to inquiries. Not expected to be any additional cost.

d. Upgraded display

Improved display in the gymnasium hallway could include historical photos and displays, in two dimensional, three dimensional, and interactive formats. The displays would require protective cabinets, and could form a large portion of the sports museum with the relocated North Cowichan / Duncan Wall of Fame. Budget for this upgraded display is recommended at \$4,000.

- 2. The purchase of promotional items for re-sale.
 - a. Items could be sold through the Cowichan Ticket Centre, with no additional labour cost. Examples of items could include postcards, water bottles, tattoos, tshirts, caps, mini hockey sticks, "stress" pucks, hockey stick keychains, stadium blankets, cushions, mugs, hoodies, etc. An initial investment of \$4,000 is suggested.
 - b. Appropriate display cabinet for promotional items. Approximate cost of \$500.

The following increases for 2014 have already been approved by the Island Savings Centre Commission:

The second half of annual wages for the theatre publicist position - \$30,500. The second half of annual wages for the sport programmer position - \$36,000. The net cost of the compressor replacement (after BC Hydro grant, hydro savings, reduced maintenance) - \$34,000.

The remainder of the Island Savings Centre Sustainability Plan phase one identified items includes:

The reinstatement of an operations assistant position eliminated in 2009 - \$12,000 (first half)
Theatre signage - \$30,000
Washroom at stage level - \$20,000

Aquannis Centre upgrades - \$0
Paving - \$600,000
Next lift of \$234,000 transfer to reserve

Note 4

Some sound equipment replacement, due to corrosion and degradation, has become a priority. This would upgrade equipment in the Arena, Genoa Room, Heritage Hall, and Multi-Purpose Hall.

Total of \$30,000 required

Note 5

The administrative secretary position for the Cowichan Theatre currently works four days per week. It has been identified as a high priority to reinstate this position to five days per week (full time). Expected cost of one additional day per week is \$13,000.

Potential options for direction in Budget Preparation

1. Priority is for the completion of phase 1 of the Island Savings Centre Sustainability Plan as targeted.

Expected Ramifications

- With the hiring of a part time operations assistant, and one additional day per week for the Theatre administration secretary, all of the identified high priority staffing is included.
- With the theatre signage, washrooms at stage level, north wall cladding, the new item of sound equipment, and paving, all identified high priority capitals needs will be addressed.
- With the next lift of the transfer to reserve, the phased in approach of saving for long term building replacement will continue.
- Requisition increase would be approximately 22 %.
- 2. Defer the cost of a major re-paving project to 2015, to reduce requisition in 2014.

Expected Ramifications

- A necessary project would be delayed
- Some amount of patching would still be necessary to address risk
- Grant funding to make the parking areas environmentally friendly could be announced by 2015
- Requisition increase with all other priorities included would be approximately 6%.
- 3. Defer the cost of paving, and do not increase the transfer to reserve as outlined in the sustainability plan.

Expected Ramifications

- Stalls the phased in approach to long term building replacement
- Would still transfer \$468,000 into reserve funds
- Could achieve a 0% requisition increase
- Could place approximately \$30,000 in a second, targeted reserve fund for a 2015 (or possibly 2016) paving project to defray that cost.
- 4. Inclusion of Incomplete division work plan initiatives for 2014

Island Savings Centre division

- Partnership on a primary care facility with the Vancouver Island Health Authority for the aquannis centre (cost currently unknown)
- Review food and beverage plan for the Island Savings Centre (new proposal for arena concession and use of vending machines could have budget impact)
- Promote the world's largest hockey stick and puck (display and promotional item costs as outlined in previous report)

Arts and Culture division

- Renovate an existing room to be a staff room for Theatre technical crew (no increase in budget expected)
- Renovate Theatre staff offices (no increase in budget expected)

Facilities, Fleet and Transit division

- Continue to identify possible energy savings initiatives
- 5. Inclusion of Parks, Recreation, and Culture department initiatives for 2014
- A sport tourism strategy
- A Cowichan Valley parks, recreation, and culture master plan
- The establishment of an arts and culture function
- Region wide marketing, including social media
